Child Abuse and Neglect: Protecting our Children - NYS OCFS Child Abuse, Maltreatment, and Neglect Certifying Course

It's hard to believe that abuse of any kind is found in our community but it is indeed a very real phenomenon. Each of us can be a person of action to stop as well as to prevent abuse. We are obligated by the State, but first and foremost by a Higher Authority. Learn about your responsibility as a mandated reporter and learn to recognize the signs and symptoms of abuse and neglect as well as how, when, and why to intervene. Ms. Wilbur will focus on the cultural and religious context within the Jewish community and the statutes and regulations pertaining to child abuse and maltreatment.

Reggio Emilia Documentation Techniques that Support Communication with Parents

Teaching and learning emerges from an intensely collaborative partnership among teachers, children, and parents. Using documentation display boards to encourage children to tell their story fosters communication with parents about the meaningful experiences that take place in their classroom. Cantor Horowitz will share how this technique encourages teachers to use it as an additional tool and he will offer suggestions for integration.

Toddler Curriculum Comes Alive

The needs of toddlers are unique and require adults to understand their developmental needs and growing sense of autonomy. Ms. Fox will share songs, activities, and strategies to use in the classroom as well as methods to assist toddlers' growing needs for independence while minimizing the inevitable power struggles.

Understanding and Educating Preschool Children with AD/HD

Building Number Sense and Mathematical Thinking through Interactive Math Games

Follow-up discussions to the games will provide an opportunity to collaboratively develop user-friendly math checklists, as part of the ongoing assessment process.

Exploring Interactive Writing

Grades: K-2

Knowledge of how the English alphabetic system works is a necessary component of learning to read and write and the most effective way to learn it is in an authentic context. In order for children to read and write with purpose and meaning throughout their lives, they must learn early on that what they say can be written and what is written can be read. "Interactive Writing" offers K-2 children an opportunity to compose their own messages, learn how to relate letters and sounds to encode their messages, and finally to read their messages in a shared setting.

Fitting in Social Studies During a Crowded Day

Learn ideas and methods to develop meaningful Social Studies lessons that incorporate the content and skills for your grade level. Drawing upon the concepts of Backwards Design and Inquiry-Based Method of teaching Social Studies, we will explore unit plans and day-to-day lesson plans.

How can we Differentiate in the Grades 6-8 Math Classroom: A Transition in Pedagogy for Experienced Teachers

The Five W's (and the H) of Current Events

Cyberspace Rebbe/Morah: How to Put your Classroom Online - Today! Part II

Rabbi Daum will get you on your way to creating your own online material with a practical hands-on demonstration of the process. Learn how to make use of websites such as moodle.org, quia.com, and torahskills.org to create online activities such as quizzes, interactive games, online journals, and more. Discover just how easy it is to post homework notices online, create a classroom message board, and much more. No programming skills needed, however it is recommended that participants feel comfortable using the web, keyboard, and mouse.

Fostering Student Growth in Understanding Torah
